3 New Memoirs of Queer Parenthood and Beyond

Three new memoirs each offer different looks at queer parenthood while giving us nuanced explorations of selves, society, family, and what we pass on to the next generation. Add them to your summer reading list.

"Gay Mormon Dad," by Chad Anderson, illustrated by Remy Burke (Graphic Mundi) is a graphic memoir that chronicles his journey from a

childhood of physical and emotional abuse and strict religious practice to coming out at 32 years old and living as a proud gay dad. The narrative moves back and forth between his childhood, when he learned what is expected of a "good" Mormon, to his later life after coming out, when he is making his way

Barbara A. Lenk, the first openly gay justice to serve on the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court, has died, the state's highest court said. She was 75. Lenk died May 19, surrounded by her family; the court's statement did not give a cause of death.

Lenk served 27 years on the bench. Republican Governor Bill Weld ap-

Jason Collins, the first openly gay active player in NBA history, who went on to become a pioneer for inclusion and an ambassador for the league, has died after an eight-month battle with glioblastoma, his family announced through the NBA. He was 47.

Collins spent 13 seasons in the league across six franchises, including

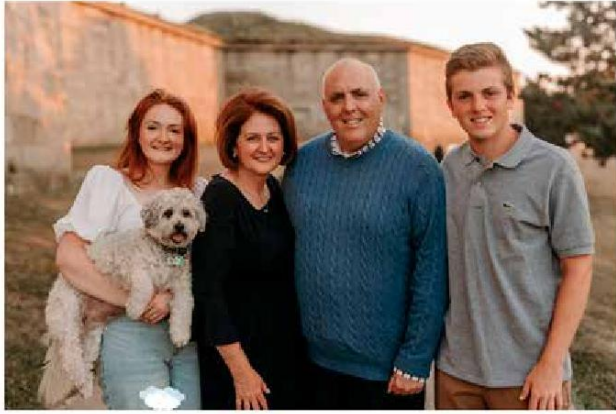

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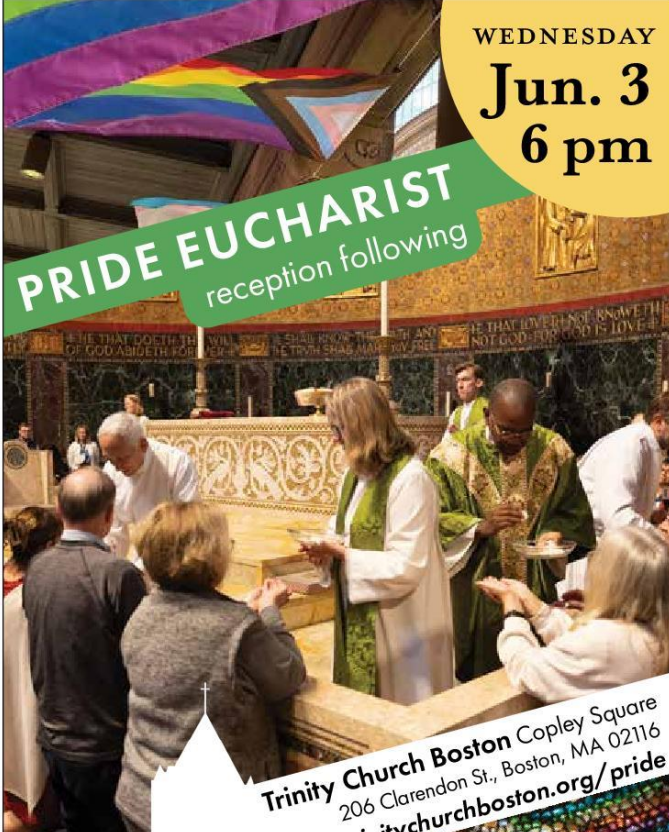

You’d even be forgiven for thinking it might be hosted by Olympic diver **Tom Daley**, the most famous devotee of the art of crocheting either straight or gay, clothed or not. The show in question is hosted by **Peter Bisuito**, who is described as a “local artist, comedian, and producer”. Apparently he has done several of these shows in gay venues which raise money for dog rescue — and who could have an issue with that (with the possible exception of **Kristi Noem**). But this particular installment of his show was going to feature someone who is no stranger to controversy — the legendary and iconic **Lady Bunny** (who would presumably be crocheting and hopefully not naked).

For those of you not in the know, Bunny is an outspoken critic of virtually everyone and everything. I believe even I have been the target of her rapier wit — and who could have an issue with moi? I seem to recall that during the last presidential election, she took issue with **Kamala Harris**...for not being liberal enough! Well, we live in a free society, and I will defend everyone’s right to voice an opinion. However, this current controversy is in Florida, and that’s far from a free society these days. Apparently a member of the Broward County Jewish Federation took issue with Bunny’s criticism of Israel’s actions toward Palestine. Personally, I wouldn’t wade into those waters even if I were Moses fleeing Pharaoh. But Bunny did — and apparently that’s why she’s canceled. And since at least a handful of people could have come out to protest a giant drag queen and a gay man crocheting on stage, I can’t really blame Hunters for cancelling. But here’s what I can say — either we’re for free speech or we’re not.

Speaking of cancellations, the Long Beach Pride Festival was called off only hours before it was supposed to begin. The day before the festival, the City of Long Beach had lawyers send out a cease-and-desist letter claiming the organizers “failed to timely submit the required application materials and supporting documentation necessary for permit review.” Aren’t permits reviewed more than hours before an event? Like, months? Anyway, this statement was hastily posted: “The Long Beach Pride Festival will not be able to take place this year as sufficient information to safely permit the event has not been made available by the event organizers.” I’m not pointing fingers, but I hasten to add that such hiccups didn’t happen the two years when yours truly hosted Long Beach Pride.

A stalwart on the Pride circuit is **Kylie Minogue**. In her recently released Netflix documentary, she revealed that she went through a second battle with cancer. “My second cancer diagnosis was in early 2021. I was able to keep that to myself...not like the first time. Thankfully, I got through it. Again. And all is well. Hey, who knows what’s around the corner.” She also issued the following statement: “There will be someone out there who will benefit from a gentle reminder to do their checkups. Early detection was very helpful and I am so grateful to be able to say that I am doing well today.”

Ricky Martin was kicking off the European leg of his tour in Montenegro last week when someone in the audience allegedly sprayed tear gas in the crowd. Of course, such things probably happen frequently in Montenegro. Martin was immediately whisked off of the stage and officials came in to assess the situation. After being given the all-clear, management wanted to cancel the show. Ricky refused and returned to the stage saying, “Nothing is going to stop this show. Nothing!” Plus, I’m sure plenty of people cry during a Ricky Martin concert.

The Cannes Film Festival wrapped last week, but not before the 32nd annual amfAR Gala. The event took place at the luxurious Hotel Du Cap-Eden-Roc and raised \$20 million for the Foundation for AIDS Research. Congrats!

Also raising money for the fight against AIDS are members of the original Broadway cast of “Rent”. The upcoming 30th anniversary will be celebrated with a one-night-only concert on October 26th at the Richard Rodgers Theatre on Broadway. The night will be directed by the show’s original director,

Michael Greif, who said, “Jonathan [Larsen] wrote ‘Rent’ in honor of the people he knew who were living and struggling with HIV and in honor of the many friends and contemporaries he lost to AIDS. I know he’d be proud and honored to join forces with Broadway Cares/Equity Fights AIDS to celebrate the 30th anniversary of his milestone musical.” Greif adds that the show will include “a bevy of special guests.”

Good News/Bad News. The production of “Evita” starring **Rachel Zegler** in London’s West End is coming to Broadway next spring. “But Billy,” I can hear you wondering, “is that the good news or the bad news?” That depends on your opinion of Miss Zegler, who is one of those performers who polarizes people, not unlike another actress who has never received a Tony nomination. What is undeniable is that this transfer will be lacking what has made it such a sensation in London — a balcony. In London, she sings “Don’t Cry For Me Argentina” from the outdoor balcony of the Palladium, much to the delight of people out on the street (and, surely, much to the dismay of paying patrons, who get to watch it on a video screen). Director **Jamie Lloyd** says, “I am really excited to explore a new idea, made especially for Broadway.”

Speaking of Tony snubs, the much-maligned musical of “Beaches” is skulking out of town after playing 38 shows (and 28 previews), most recently, to roughly half-full houses. Some are blaming this premature shutter on the lack of Tonys. Having not seen it, I’d think at least some of the blame should fall on the musical’s creators.

With Memorial Day in our rearview mirror, it’s time to look forward to the summer in Provincetown. This week, we take a gander at what is coming to the venerable Post Office Caf and Cabaret. Of course, their crowd-pleasing Drag Brunch will keep you laughing and liquored up during the daylight hours. As to the nighttime headliners, it wouldn’t be summer without the uproarious **Judy Gold**. **Miss Richfield 1981** joins the roster with a new show called “You Can’t Have Ice Cream When You’re Dead!”. **Paige Turner** asks the musical question, “Drag Me To The Movies?”. The multi-talented **Jamie Morris** returns with four parody shows in repertory! **Nina West** does her take on a Broadway phenomenon with “Oh, Scary!” (get it?). The ever-popular “Diva” and “Illusions — Las Vegas Review” shows return. And so much more. Check out full details on PostOfficeCafe.net.

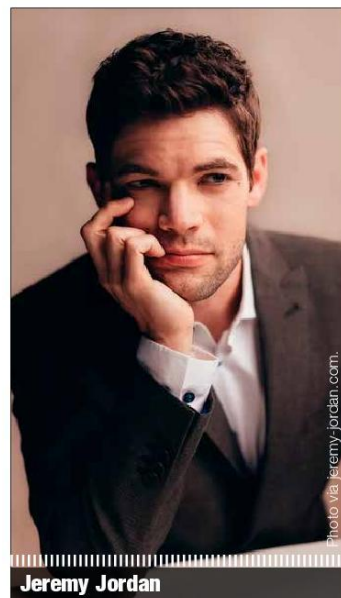

as the divorced father of two young children.

This is not an emotionally easy story: Anderson suffered physical abuse from his stepfather (as did his mother) and sexual abuse from his older brother. He was told that his thoughts of liking other boys were sinful, and he feared for his family's eternal happiness if he didn't suppress those feelings. He grew up thinking he was broken, and at one point, contemplated suicide.

At the same time, however, this is a story of hope, with the alternating chronology letting us know from the start that Anderson has found self-worth and happiness. The narrative tension is not in what the outcome will be, but in how Anderson got there, and how he moved through his own trauma to become the father his sons needed. "I'd once been afraid of hurting my children by coming out," he notes. "Over time, I realized I was instead creating a world in which they'd get two happy parents."

Remy Burke's bold illustrations with heavy black lines complement and enhance the text, offering visual cues to guide the reader across the chronology, with cold blues representing the earlier years and warm reds the later ones. Text and images combine into a powerful memoir of transformation and healing.

"Ugly: A Letter to My Daughter," by Stephanie Fairington (Pantheon): is part memoir, part cultural history, and part social commentary. "Ugly," Fairington writes, is "a word with fangs that can kill a woman's self-esteem in one bite." In these pages, she shares the story of how she came to see herself as ugly, offering reflections and thoughtful analysis to help her daughter (and, presumably, readers and their daughters) override similar toxic messages.

Fairington explores differences in what constitutes beauty across cultures and eras, and the impact of various influences including racial and ethnic stereotypes, disability, gender, queerness, and biological connection. But while ugliness and beauty form the throughlines here, in both literal and more figurative senses, Fairington also looks more broadly at ideas of difference and belonging. Her examination is underpinned not only by her childhood experiences and her growing sense of self as a lesbian with gender dysphoria, but also by how she and her now-wife Sabrina formed their own family, how her own self-image played into that process, and how motherhood—specifi-

cally, her own nongestational motherhood—has sharpened her desire to unpack and challenge many of society's messages about beauty, biology, and family.

The more personal sections of the book rub shoulders with ones that delve into more academic topics like social constructionism, structuralism, queer theory, and cultural history, but each approach illuminates the other. Although her scope is wide-ranging, Fairington keeps returning to the goal of offering her daughter a guidebook for her own developing self. "I hope you'll always see beauty where others don't and tend to it in yourself and others in your gentle way because, ultimately, it's all beautiful," she writes. "Even the things that are ugly—ugly words, ugly ideas, ugly beliefs, ugly behaviors—are necessary to the expansion of our humanity and spiritual awakening." More than just a look at beauty standards, this is a richly textured and thought-provoking read.

"Spanning Season: An Experiment in Queer Parenthood," by Joseph Osmundson (Bloomsbury) is a memoir of Lambda Literary Award finalist and microbiologist Osmundson's quest for parenthood and an evocative look at how environmental, economic, social, and biological factors all play a part in forming and sustaining families.

Osmundson had wanted to be a parent since he was a child, and even wanted to be pregnant, he writes. His concerns about climate change, his own economic precariousness, and his own ability as a parent led him to think he would never become one, however—until a lesbian friend from college asked if he would contribute sperm and co-parent the resulting child with her and her partner. But not all plans go the way one expects....

Without giving too much away, I'll note that this is not simply a tale of family creation. It is a reflection on family building, yes, but also a broader look at the interconnected systems of family, gender, race/ethnicity, and the environment; at the role and limits of biology in queer parenthood; and at what it means to nourish, nurture, hope, and grieve. Thoroughly original, thought-provoking, and entertaining, it is a highly recommended look at queer parenthood with a wide—one might say "fish-eye"—lens.

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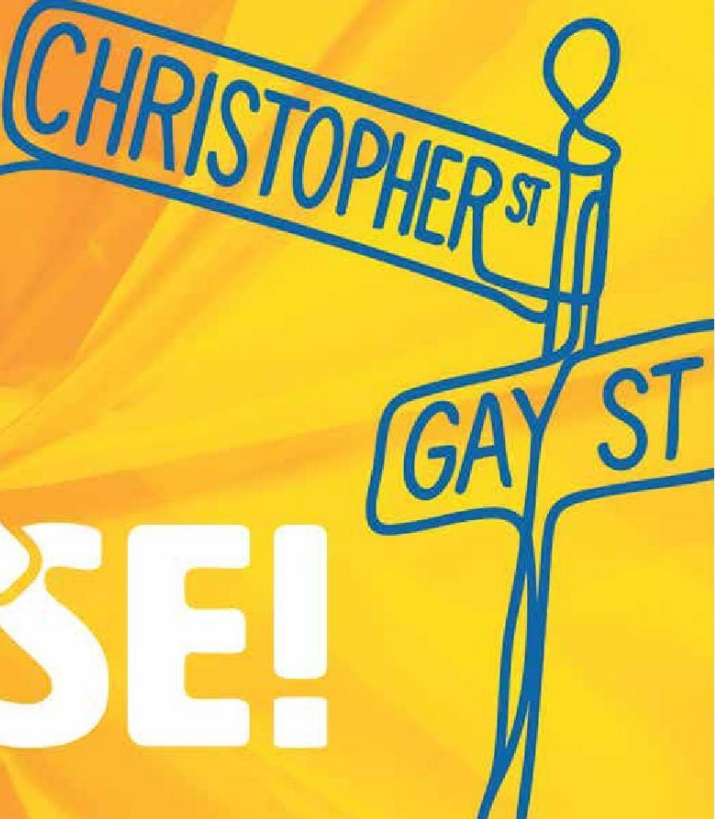

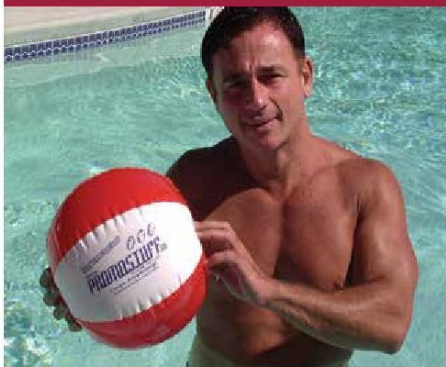

pointed her to the Superior Court in 1993 and the Appeals Court in 1995, and Governor Deval Patrick named her to the SJC in 2011 — making her the first openly gay member of the same court that, less than a decade earlier, had ruled that barring same-sex couples from marriage violated the Massachusetts Constitution. After Chief Justice Ralph Gants died in September

2020, Lenk, the senior justice, took up the duties of chief justice until her mandatory retirement that December.

Born in Queens, New York, in 1950 to a bookbinder and a housekeeper, Lenk grew up in a working-class household where Polish was her first language. She earned a bachelor's degree from Fordham and a Ph.D. in political philosophy from Yale, then graduated from Harvard Law School in 1979 and began her career at the Boston firm Brown Rudnick, where she became a partner and built a practice in

First Amendment law.

Lenk authored hundreds of opinions, admired for their rigor and for references that ranged from Greek mythology to popular music. She carried a handwritten reminder of the principles that guided her: "Hear courteously; answer wisely; consider soberly; decide impartially." She treasured mentoring young associates and law clerks, many of whom stayed close to her for life. Away from the court, she was happiest outdoors — long walks with her dogs through the Carlisle Cranberry Bog and

Estabrook Woods, and annual family trips to Acadia.

"It has been my lifelong goal," she said at her retirement, "to leave the world not less and worse, but greater and more beautiful than when it was given to us."

Lenk is survived by her spouse, Debra Krupp; her daughters, Katie and Julia; her son-in-law, Jake; and her grandchildren, Haleigh, Paxton, and Benson. The family asks that donations be made to Care Dimensions, Feeding America, or Boston's Pine Street Inn.

32 games with the Celtics in 2012-13. He came out publicly in April 2013, in a first-person essay for Sports Illustrated — an announcement that arrived near the end of his playing career, while he was a free agent. The following season, he signed with Brooklyn and became the first openly gay player to appear in an NBA game.

"Jason changed lives in unexpected ways and was an inspiration to all who knew him and to those who admired him from afar," his family said in the statement released through the NBA.

Boston shaped that decision more than most fans realize. At Stanford, Collins's roommate was Joseph P. Kennedy III, who later spent eight years representing Massachusetts in Congress. Collins wrote that watching Kennedy march in Boston's 2012 Pride parade — while Collins himself stayed silent — was the moment he knew he had

to raise his hand.

He wore No. 98 for Boston, Washington and Brooklyn, a quiet tribute to 1998, the year Matthew Shepard was murdered in Wyoming.

In June 2013, weeks after the essay, Collins returned to Boston for Pride Week, embraced by a city and a community that claimed him as one of its own. He had said he wanted to keep playing, and he did — 22 more games the following season with Brooklyn, quiet proof that an out player could simply be a player.

His on-court numbers were modest: 3.6 points and 3.7 rebounds a game. But the stat line was never the point. He set picks, protected teammates, and changed the league.

The Human Rights Campaign called him a legend for the LGBTQ+ community. Collins is survived by his husband, Brunson Green, and his twin brother, former NBA player Jarron Collins, who shortly before Jason's death accepted an award on his behalf, calling him "the bravest, strongest man I've ever known."

Long before Washington, Frank was a young chief assistant to Boston Mayor Kevin White — part of the City Hall circle that saw the potential in the

derelict Quincy Market buildings. During White's administration, the city worked with developer James Rouse and architect Benjamin Thompson to transform them into Faneuil Hall Marketplace, now one of Boston's best-known destinations.

Frank, a Massachusetts Democrat elected 16 times to represent the state's 4th Congressional

District, was 86 when he died Tuesday evening, May 19, at his home in Ogunquit, Maine, where he was in hospice care with congestive heart failure.

In 1987, Frank became the first member of Congress to publicly come out as gay voluntarily, and he spent the following decades as one of the most visible LGBTQ+ leaders in national politics. He

went on to coauthor the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010.

In his final weeks, Frank gave a steady run of interviews urging Democrats toward pragmatism ahead of the 2028 elections. In a May 3 interview with the Boston Globe, he said he hoped Democrats would act on his warnings.



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
